Proclamation by Governor Jim Justice

Whereas, Pancreatic cancer is the third leading cause of cancer-related death in the United States and is anticipated to become the second in the next few years; and

Whereas, Pancreatic cancer is one of the nation's deadliest cancers, with a five-year survival rate of just 9 percent; and

Whereas, in 2019, an estimated 56,770 people will be diagnosed with pancreatic cancer in the United States, and approximately 45,750 will die from the disease; and

Whereas, in 2019, it is estimated that 1,475 West Virginians will be diagnosed with this deadly cancer; and

Whereas, Pancreatic cancer is the ninth most commonly diagnosed cancer in women and the tenth most commonly diagnosed cancer in men; and

Whereas, risk factors for developing pancreatic cancer include family history of the disease, age, chronic or hereditary pancreatitis, smoking, obesity and long-standing diabetes; and

Whereas,

Pancreatic cancer may cause only vague symptoms that could indicate many different conditions within the abdomen or gastrointestinal tract. Symptoms include pain (usually abdominal or back pain), weight loss, jaundice (yellowing of skin and eyes), loss of appetite, nausea, changes in stool and recent on-set diabetes; and

Whereas, the location of the pancreas deep in the abdominal cavity is a factor hindering early detection of pancreatic cancer; and

Whereas, surgical removal of the tumor is possible in less than 20 percent of patients with adenocarcinoma, the most common type of pancreatic cancer. Chemotherapy and/or radiation may be offered before or after surgery; and

Whereas, there are complex biological features of pancreatic tumor that distinguish it from many other cancer types; and

Whereas, the good health and well-being of the citizens of West Virginia are enhanced as a direct result of increased awareness about pancreatic cancer and research into early detection, causes and effective treatments; and

Whereas, this month brings support to those patients currently battling pancreatic cancer, as well as those who have lost their battle to this disease.

Now, Therefore, Be it Resolved that I, Jim Justice, Governor of the Great State of West Virginia, do hereby proclaim November 2019 as:

Pancreatic Cancer Awareness Month

in the Mountain State and encourage all citizens to join me in this observance.
