A PROCLAMATION

By the Governor

WHEREAS, September 11, 2023, marks the 22nd anniversary of the largest act of terrorism on United States soil, a day forever marked as one of the most infamous in this nation's history; and

WHEREAS, on September 11, 2001, at the World Trade Center twin towers in New York City, at the Pentagon in Washington, D.C., and in southwestern Pennsylvania, acts by terrorists were so horrendous as to sear the souls of man; and

WHEREAS, on December 18, 2001, the Congress of the United States adopted Joint Resolution Seventy-One (Public Law 107-89) designating September 11th of each year as Patriot Day, and by Public Law 111-13 approved on the April 21, 2009, requested the observance of September 11th as an annually recognized National Day of Service and Remembrance;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, JIM JUSTICE, by virtue of the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of West Virginia, I call upon the citizens of West Virginia to honor the victims of the attack on September 11, 2001, and do hereby ORDER that all State flags displayed at all State facilities, along with the flag of the United States, be displayed at half-staff the day of September 11, 2023; and do further REQUEST that all citizens of the State of West Virginia observe a moment of silence beginning at 8:46 a.m. Eastern Daylight Time on that solemn day to honor the innocent victims who perished on September 11, 2001.
